# St. Albert the Great

1200-1280

Bishop, Doctor of the Church,  
and patron of scientists, philosophers,  
medical technicians, and the natural sciences.

Feast Day: November 15

St. Albert is the Universal Doctor of the Church. Notably, he was the teacher of St. Thomas Aquinas and inspired his studies.

Renowned as both a scientist and philosopher, his studies always centered around the love of Christ:

*“If, then, we possess love, we possess God, for ‘God is love.’”*

## DID YOU KNOW?

St. Albert the Great is known as the Doctor Universalis, “the Doctor of all things.” For this reason, our House of Studies is named after him, and our student brothers are commended to his care.

Through his careful observation of nature, he sought a deeper knowledge and love of the Creator. In his commentary on the Gospel of Matthew, he wrote: “The whole world is theology for us because the heavens proclaim the glory of God.”

The seven years of spiritual, intellectual, and pastoral formation within the context of a common life are completed under St. Albert’s patronage. Following in his footsteps, the student brothers prepare to preach the Gospel by striving to comprehend more fully the goodness, beauty, and truth of God.

Dear Friends,

With your prayers and God's grace, some incredible things are happening in the United States. Often, developing nations are held as examples of religious order growth. And while this can be true, there is growth right here at home. **In fact, Dominicans in formation in the United States now account for about one-seventh of all Dominican vocations worldwide!** And interestingly enough, we're growing the most where the need for evangelization is the greatest: the Northeast and the Pacific Coast.

It cannot be an accident that God is having the Dominicans grow in the least church and unevangelized parts of our nation—places that also represent centers of modern influence and power: Silicon Valley and Washington, D.C.

Pope Francis has called us all to “go to the periphery” of the church's reach. Indeed, in San Francisco, the periphery often comes to us. Many who may barely be Catholic find their way to our great St. Dominic's Church and its St. Jude Shrine. Here, pilgrims light candles and beg for St. Jude's intercession, praying to God for help in some of life's most desperate causes. And we friars are there to support them.

The name of Judas Iscariot, the traitor, often causes St. Jude to be forgotten by many. Thus, he is the patron of those whom the world considers most forgotten—the poorest and most despairing of souls. Let us all pray that those who are lost be found by our loving Savior (Luke 15).

Each October (the month of the Most Holy Rosary) we ask our friends to help our brothers in formation with a gift, and you came through spectacularly this year. With growth in vocations comes growth in our formation expenses, a great challenge to have. With you, and God's grace, there is no challenge we can't meet. # St. Jude: The Forgotten Saint

## Patron of the despairing

**O**n the 28th of October, we celebrated the feast of St. Jude Thaddeus, who shares his first name with Judas Iscariot, the traitor of Jesus. Because of this, St. Jude is often forgotten by many.

Yet, it's because of this similarity in name that the Church invokes him for those who are most forgotten, those for whom hope is despaired.

The Shrine of St. Jude in San Francisco was founded in the 1930s during the Great Depression. During those dark years, many who despaired in their situation found hope through his intercession.

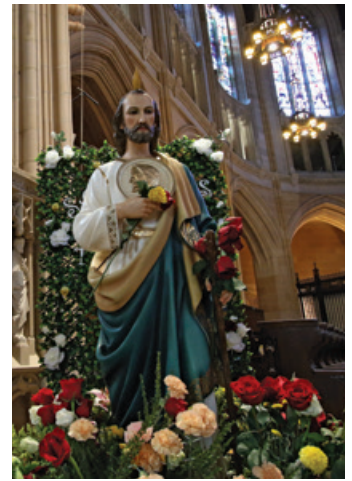
In the 1960s, those who were disillusioned by the cultural challenges rippling through society, found refuge and peace at the St. Jude shrine.

In the 1980s and 1990s, during the AIDS crisis in San Francisco, St. Jude inspired countless souls to convert to Catholicism, and brought peace and comfort to the suffering before they died.

Today, St. Jude continues to intercede in powerful ways. We see people returning to the faith, reunited with their families, and finding Christ again.

People who feel most disillusioned and alone, forgotten, or on the margins of society, have always found comfort in St. Jude, the patron of the forgotten and despairing.

We remember this forgotten saint and thank him for the hope he brings. May St. Jude always be at our side, especially in moments of doubt and despair, ordering our hearts and minds back to Christ, who is the source of all hope.

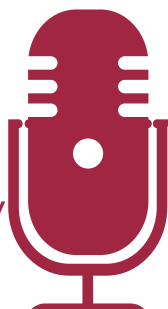

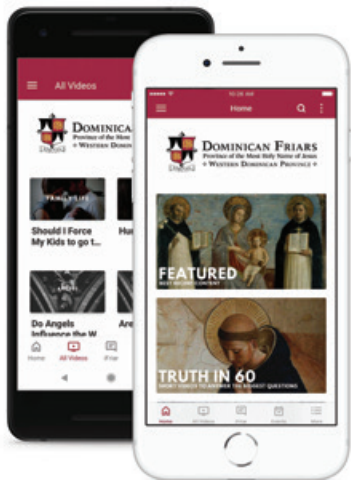

# A Profile in Generosity: The Hammill Family

Led by Dominicans to God and one another

## How did you first get connected with the Dominicans?

We met them at just about the same time we met each other—when we were undergrads at Occidental College in Los Angeles. The Newman Catholic Community at Oxy was run by the Dominicans down the street at St. Dominic’s. Kathleen was the Newman student leader and Ryan was the student leader of InterVarsity Christian Fellowship. We met at an ecumenical Palm Sunday BBQ—it took awhile, but eventually we fell in love. Kathleen was a philosophy major; Dominican spirituality was a natural fit for her, so after graduation she did a Dominican Volunteer Year in San Francisco, and once Ryan got his act together and proposed, we were married by Fr. Michael Fones, O.P., back at St. Dominic’s in LA.

## What’s your favorite memory with Dominicans?

Getting married, obviously! But we have so many great memories with them. Kathleen twice attended the Dominican Institute of Student Ministry at St. Albert’s while in student ministry and got to meet many of the brothers. When the Dominicans were working on getting Ryan to swim the Tiber, Fr. Jerome Cudden, O.P., invited Ryan to Tenebrae at St. Dominic’s. It was a beautiful and haunting experience listening to the Lamentations of Jeremiah by candlelight. When we lived in the Bay Area, Kathleen was part of the Dominican Laity at St. Dominic’s in SF, run by Fr. Augustine Hilander, O.P., and Deacon Dino and Katharine Ornidó. The Ornidós did our marriage prep as well—they have been such an immense blessing to us.

## Why do you choose to support the Dominicans?

So that they will have the resources to renew the church and save Western civilization. No pressure, guys!

## What do the Dominicans offer that you believe is of the most value to society today?

Their attention to both philosophy and Scripture has enabled them to thread the needle of modernity exceptionally well. Without being swept along by the zeitgeist nor trying to re-pristinize the faith into a simulacrum of the Middle Ages, the Dominicans show us what fidelity to the church can look like in the modern world. That’s a priceless gift.

## Why do you think interest in the Dominican Order is growing?

Because they’re winners! And everyone loves a winner. If you can confidently plunder the philosophic gold of the Egyptians, synthesize that with a faithful reading of the Bible, and cheerfully live a life of prayer and evangelism—who wouldn’t want a piece of that? There should be Western Province Dominicans in every city on the West Coast!

## What has surprised you most about working with/knowing the Dominicans?

People see vowed religious in habits and tend to think of them as out of touch and overly strict and irrelevant to the modern world; in our experience of the Western Province Dominicans, nothing could be further from the truth! Every priest and brother that we’ve met is so exuberant and full of life! The Dominicans demonstrate how the old (Scripture, tradition, philosophy) brings life to the new.
