DID YOU KNOW?

During his travels from Europe to America in the early 19th century, Archbishop Joseph Alemany, O.P. (co-founder of the Western Dominican Province) passed through England. During that time, he befriended St. John Henry Cardinal Newman, the famous Anglican convert and patron of today's Catholic Newman Centers.

Fittingly, the Western Dominican Province launched the first Dominican-run—and fifth oldest—Newman Center in the U.S., establishing it at the University of Washington in 1908.

Your support helps us preach the truth of the Eucharist



My Dear Friend in St. Dominic,

The Lord Himself charged us that, 'unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you.' (John 6:53)

Yet, in a recent Pew Research Center study, it was revealed that almost 70% of those who identify as Catholic do not believe in the real presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. That means that the source and summit of our faith is denied by nearly 70% of Catholics! It is not hyperbole to say that this is a huge problem.

To rectify the moral, intellectual and spiritual poverty of our time—and to reclaim the truth of the Eucharist—we need gifted preachers who can win souls for Christ by boldly proclaiming the beauty of Truth, rooted in love.

Thankfully, one of the greatest saints of the Eucharist was our Dominican brother, St. Thomas Aquinas. The only known poetry of the Angelic Doctor focuses on the Eucharist and is still widely used today in the Church in hymns such as *O salutaris*, *Pange lingua* (*Tantum ergo*), and *Adoro te Devote*. In these beautiful texts we hear the theology of the Eucharist masterfully proclaimed.

In an age when so many religious orders are declining in numbers, we are blessed with men who are on fire for the Gospel—true sons of our Holy Father St. Dominic, who longed to set the world ablaze with the light of Truth. These men are also very smart—they have the capacity and zeal for study which is characteristic to Dominicans. These men are also very human and approachable—skills which are essential if we are to engage and accompany the present generations in the life of faith. Finally, these men want to be holy—fervent in prayer and striving for holiness. They are men who want to be saints.

The Church needs these young vocations now, more than ever. And we need you to help make it possible. Please continue to support our young brothers with your prayers and with your donations, especially during the month of October, when we celebrate the Feast of the Most Holy Rosary. Together, we can preach the truth of the Eucharist and win back souls for Christ.

Br. Matthew Francis is from Irvine, CA, and has known the Dominicans his whole life since his uncle, Fr. Joseph Sergott, O.P., is a friar of the Western Dominican Province. Educated at Gonzaga University, where he earned a B.A. in Mathematics and Philosophy, he enjoys "board sports" such as skateboarding, surfing and board games. Inspired by Hebrews 12:29, he wants to be consumed by the fire of God's love and used as a light for others. This desire to share the faith is one of the many things that attracted him to the Order of Preachers. whose charism and mission is to preach the Gospel for the salvation of souls.

He enjoys backpacking, swimming, cycling, and running, which may be why he relates so well to 1 Corinthians 9:24-27, where St. Paul draws a comparison between the spiritual life and running a race. "The world's need for Christ is urgent," Br. Michael Thomas observes, "and the Dominican is called to bring the light of Christ to all nations."

Br. Xavier Marie grew up in Beijing, China, and went to high school in Laredo, TX. In his free time he enjoys playing basketball, rockclimbing, and sketching. While earning a B.S. in Bioengineering from the University of California at Berkeley, he met the Dominicans and began attending daily Mass at St. Albert's Priory. It was there that he learned about the Order's charism and was drawn to our common life, prayer, study, and preaching. He finds inspiration in the passage from Song of Songs 8:6-7 in which love is described as a burning flame. Br. Xavier Marie explains, "It is a perfect image of Christ's burning love for us."

Br. Kevin Peter was born near Seattle, but grew up in Clearwater, FL. He returned to the West Coast for studies where he received a B.A. in Liberal Arts from Thomas Aquinas College. Fr. Paul Raftery, O.P., one of the college chaplains, introduced him to the Dominican life. Br. Kevin Peter greatly admires the Dominican St. Juan Macias, who like his contemporaries St. Martin de Porres and St. Rose of Lima, cared for the poor and marginalized. Reflecting on Colossians 3:1-4, he contemplates the mystery of dying with Christ in order to live with Him. Thus Br. Kevin Peter desires to preach Christ crucified as a Dominican friar.

t's with great joy that we celebrate the recent ordination to the diaconate of Rev. Br. Gregory Augustine Liu, O.P. A deacon shares in Christ's mission and grace in a special way. Through the sacrament, he is marked with what the Church calls an imprint or "character" which cannot be removed, and which configures him to Christ, who made himself the "deacon" or "servant" of all. The title "deacon" comes from the Greek word "diakonia," which in Christian theology signifies service.

Dominicans Elect New Master of the Order



A Profile in Generosity: The Sherman Family

A journey to the Church with love and support from the Dominicans

How did you first connect with the Dominicans?

Julianne: My husband wanted to become Catholic. I did not. So, he had been trying to find a parish that clearly preached the Gospel, had some sense of community and could represent the best of the Catholic Church. (Because I was a professional fault finder, I did not want to become Catholic and was looking for any reason to get out of it). Nevertheless, when we were invited by a friend to visit the Dominican parish of Blessed Sacrament in Seattle, both of us felt like we could make a home here and raise our kids here. Fr. Christopher Fadok was so pastoral, calling everyone to live their faith authentically, while at the same time he preached intellectually. The combination of erudition and passion broke down my irrational objections. I knew our priests really loved God, really loved their parishioners, and really knew the truth. I converted two years later.

Keith: The Dominicans have three things that attracted us to them instantly: rich and beautiful liturgy, unapologetically orthodox preaching, and their genuine encouragement to parents as the primary educators of their children. Julianne was hooked despite her one-time promise to me that hell would freeze over before she became Catholic!

What's a favorite memory you have of spending time with the Dominicans?

Julianne: I have a vivid memory of singing the litany of the saints during a baptism I attended with the Dominicans. I started weeping with the thought, "I'm not alone anymore", and I just kept weeping thinking of all these friends that are actively and lovingly fighting for us—for me—as I discerned entering the Catholic Church.


Keith: The Dominicans, whether in the parish hall, at a picnic, at a new house blessing, at a baptism celebration, or over

dinner at our own dining room table, have blessed us with their lives. We have been enriched by their personal stories, their theological and historical insight, and their pursuit of the good, the beautiful, and the true in everything from science and art to quality jokes!

Why do you support the Dominicans?

We support the Dominicans because they are true to their mission to praise, to bless and to preach. They praise with rich and excellent liturgy; they bless

as they administer the sacraments and encourage their congregations; they faithfully preach Christ and Church teaching. These things are all an antidote to the spiritual malaise, cultural decay and moral obfuscation swirling around us all.



The Dominican Order is a place that promotes undiluted

Catholicism. They are brave and true to their mission to praise, to bless, to preach. It's just not worth being Catholic if you water down the liturgy, homily, Church teaching, the central role of the Sacraments, hymnals, even the art and architecture.

What do you wish other people knew about the Dominicans?

We think it's funny that the Dominicans have fewer saints than some other orders, but the ones they have are the "sha-bam!" kind! St. Thomas Aquinas counts as 30 saints, right?
