





DID YOU KNOW?

A lesser known legend of the Dominican Order, the orange tree has carried special meaning to the Dominicans for over 800 years, representing the life of the Order. According to tradition, St. Dominic brought an orange tree from his native Spain to Santa Sabina in Rome, which would later become the headquarters of the Order of Preachers. In 1379 AD, Catherine of Siena gifted candied oranges from Dominic's tree to Pope Urban VI, reminding him that one's bitter sufferings turn sweet when united with Christ.

Over the years, sprigs from the original orange tree were propagated all over the world in Dominican communities. **Continuing the legacy today, an orange tree propagated from St. Dominic's tree grows at St. Albert the Great Priory in Oakland, the house of studies for the Western Dominican Province.**

St. Rose modeled the value of redemptive suffering and became the first canonized saint born in the Americas.

can be found in "Friars on the Move" on p. 9.



"The ordination to the priesthood is definitely pure God's grace! The day after my ordination I celebrated my first Holy Mass at St. Albert's Priory. Afterwards, I was on my way to visit friends, and in the airport I met an elderly lady who asked me if I am a priest. I said yes. She said she used to be a Catholic and stopped practicing for many different reasons. However, she attends Catholic occasions such as baptisms, quinceañeras, weddings, and funerals whenever she's invited by her family and friends. After a long discussion, I asked her if she wanted to be invited back to the Church. She paused, cried, and said yes. I suddenly found myself hearing her confession in the boarding area of an airport. After 50 years away from the Church, she said 'It's great to be back home.' It is a humbling experience to be instrumental of God's grace for the salvation of souls."



Dominican Cooperator Brothers

Br. Pascal Strader is now a cooperator brother and will finish his studies this year before taking his first ministry assignment. Formerly known as lay brothers, cooperator brothers are Dominican friars called to religious life, but not to the priesthood. They take the same vows as Dominican priests and live in the same community, centered on common life. Included among the many Dominicans whom the Church has beatified or canonized are four cooperator brothers: Bl. Simon Ballachi, St. John Macias, St. Martin de Porres, and Bl. James of Ulm.

St. Michael the Archangel, a Powerful Defender in All Battles

Learn how this saint helps us flex our spiritual muscles!

On Easter Monday 1949 at 10:45pm, the priests who had undertaken the exorcism of a youth named “Robbie” had a breakthrough. Possessed by as many as ten demons, Robbie had been haunted for years in the wake of his use of a Ouija board to contact his deceased grandmother. After months of exorcisms, the priests invoked St. Michael to cast out the demons. Suddenly, a voice who identified himself as St. Michael commanded the demons to depart. According to eyewitnesses, Robbie went into violent convulsions and the demons left with a “sonic boom.” (The priests praying the Divine Office in a nearby church also heard this “sonic boom” and saw an incredible light illumine the whole church.) When Robbie came out of his trance, he related how he had a vision of St. Michael vanquishing Satan in a battle for his soul. Though many know this story through the popular 1970’s book and movie based on these real-life events, the role of St. Michael was somewhat muted in the fictional accounts.

Although dramatic moments of exorcism are captivating, St. Michael’s intercession is not limited to these moments. His influence is present to us in our daily life. For this reason, the prayer to St. Michael the Archangel is an essential part of our spiritual health. Originally abridged from Pope Leo XIII’s more robust composition which he was compelled to pen after his troubling mystical experience with the “smoke of Satan,” this simple prayer creates dynamic spiritual protection and power, both in our own life and in the life of the Church. As struggles abound in the lives of our families and culture, St. Michael’s patronage activates the full resource of the heavenly host. St. Paul makes clear that every struggle, no matter how mundane, has a spiritual dimension (Ephesians 6:12). The spiritual world is not, as some may think, a world of unambiguous light and goodness. There is a nefarious aspect of the spiritual world which sow the seeds of chaos, violence, and darkness. Evil exits first, and

primarily, in the spiritual realm. Whatever our struggles, St. Michael empowers us to flex our spiritual muscles and we experience his assistance in many ways.

One particular way is how St. Michael helps us in the daily overcoming of temptation and growing in virtue. Consider St. Michael's origin story from Scripture and Tradition (Isaiah 14:12, Revelation 12). In the first cosmic upheaval between God and His creation, when Satan defies God and blasphemes the Holy Name, the leader of the heavenly host responds: "Who is like God?", in Hebrew, *Mikha'el*. The first rhetorical question in history is the name Michael. This name reveals the potency of humility when it is blended with courage. Against pride, which is rooted in self (the heart of sin is always "I"), Michael expresses the humility which is the foundation of virtue. Humility recognizes that God alone is the source of all life and happiness. Without God, we are nothing. If we want to be happy, humility is the first step towards our victory in the battle of selfishness. Alternatively, against a sort of false humility, Michael expresses a word of courage. False humility thinks that we are powerless in spiritual struggles. After all, who are we to overcome the devil, who has strength beyond our powers. Yet, courage recognizes that with God we can do anything. Nothing is impossible for God, and St. Michael decisively casts down the demonic hosts with this divine power flowing through him.

If we want to stand firm in overcoming daily temptations, if we want to find victory over our selfishness, if we want God's power to flourish in us even in the face of most hopeless situations, St. Michael's humble courage gives us the name and patronage upon whom we should call. When someone asks me for a simple way that they might grow in holiness and happiness, I always suggest praying to St. Michael daily. St. Michael is eager to accompany us in our daily struggles, so let us be bold to ask!



Sacred Theology. He’s been the President of the International Dominican Foundation since 2015, and President of the American Friends of the École Biblique since 2018, as well as Syndic (Treasurer) of the Province of St. Joseph.











A Profile in Generosity: Mary Coykendall

How were you first connected to the Dominicans?

My family lived in Benicia, California for many years, and my sister was involved at St. Dominic’s Church. Later, I learned more through my good friend, the late Angelo Stagnaro. Angelo and I moved into our assisted living community around the same time, and over the years I learned of

his generosity and involvement with the Dominicans. Angelo spoke highly of the Dominicans, and I came to know Fr. Peter Rogers when he occasionally visited and celebrated Mass at our community. When Angelo was unable to do so himself, I took on scheduling Masses and visits with the Dominicans, which has allowed more residents in my community to be spiritually fed and strike up their own friendships. Looking back, I recognize the Holy Spirit worked through Angelo to introduce me to holy work that aligns with my values and allows me to help advance the future of the Church.

Why do you choose to give to the Dominicans?

I grew up in a household that valued education. I fell in love with the Dominican education of young people after hearing Fr. Peter speak about the Dominican School of Philosophy & Theology (DSPT). After that, I couldn’t help but want to be a part of it!

What’s a favorite memory you have of the Dominicans?

In 2020, I helped put together care packages for DSPT students to help brighten their days during a time of isolation and virtual classes. The gifts weren’t extravagant, just something useful to help them feel support from outside of their community. In response, every student wrote me a letter sharing their story – their studies, their hopes for the future, and what they hope to contribute! These letters meant a lot more than I first realized. They reinforced my love for the Dominicans and brought a personal connection to my support. I keep them in a box to read over and over!

What does supporting the Dominicans do for you?

I love the Dominicans because they live by one of my favorite sayings: “To love God is to love people.” By supporting the Dominicans, I can show my love for God and for young people, and it enriches my faith to use the Lord’s generosity in my life to help others.

What advice do you have for students and young people?

My advice is to never stop learning—no matter your age! If you have the opportunity to go to a school like DSPT, take it. It’s such a gift. What a time to get to be a part of a great institution!
