DID YOU KNOW?

When Pope Urban IV instituted the Feast of Corpus Christi in 1264, he asked St. Thomas Aquinas and St. Bonaventure to compose the Office and Mass for the Feast. The day came to present their compositions to Pope Urban IV, and St. Thomas Aquinas presented his composition first. As St. Bonaventure listened in awe of Aquinas' beautiful work, he tore his own manuscript into pieces. When the time came to present his work, St. Bonaventure humbly acknowledged that Aquinas' work was more worthy of the Feast.

1901–1925 Patron Saint of Builders Feast Day: July 4

"I urge you with all the strength of my soul to approach the Eucharistic Table as often as possible. Feed on this Bread of the Angels from which you will draw the strength to fight inner struggles, ... because Jesus Christ has promised to those who feed themselves with the most Holy Eucharist, eternal life and the necessary graces to obtain it."

At age 12, Bl. Pier Giorgio began receiving the Eucharist daily, calling it his "appointment with the Lord." He kept this appointment devotedly until he received his final Eucharist on July 3, 1925, the day before he died.

Dear Friends in Christ and St. Dominic,

A recent poll of Catholics revealed some shocking results: almost 70% of those who self-identify as Catholics believe that the Eucharist is a mere symbol of the body and blood of Jesus Christ, and not His true Body and Blood. The numbers get a little better for Catholics who go to Mass every Sunday, although even there, the numbers are still shocking: 37% of those of us who go to Mass every Sunday believe the Eucharist is merely a symbol. Simply put, this is a disaster.

In the Gospel of St. John, our blessed Lord says that He will give us His flesh to eat, to the consternation of those standing by. Instead of saying "I am speaking to you in parables," as He does in other parts of the Gospel, our Lord reiterates, "Unless you eat of the flesh of the Son of Man and drink of His Blood, you have no life in you." Many people walked away from Him due to this "hard teaching."

The Catholic Church has always boldly and consistently proclaimed the true presence of Christ in the Eucharist. All the early Christians who came immediately after the time of the Apostles speak to this Real Presence. This teaching of the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist existed from the beginning—on the lips of our Lord Himself!

In the Eucharist, we become what we eat. We become more like Christ—and this world badly needs Christ-like people. It is the frequent reception of the Eucharist, supplemented by visits to the Blessed Sacrament in Adoration, that is the surest way to heaven.

In this issue of *Mission West*, you'll find some reflections on Priesthood and the Eucharist as the Western Dominicans join our U.S. Bishops in promoting the Eucharistic Revival! You'll hear from our newest priest, Fr. Patrick Rooney. You'll see where we are being re-deployed to help preach the Word more effectively. You'll also read about the five men who recently made Solemn Vows (until death)—pledging their entire lives to preaching Truth!

Thank you so much for your support of our Friars in our efforts. May we all continue to center our lives around the Eucharist here below, until we get home to heaven!

Dr. Scott Hahn Receives O Lumen Award

It was a joy to present Dr. Scott Hahn with the O Lumen Award. The O Lumen Award is named after the antiphon Dominicans sing in honor of St. Dominic, the 'O lumen ecclesiae' (O Light of the Church). This award is given to those who have been a true light of the Church, have preached the Gospel throughout our nation and beyond, and have advanced the evangelization mission of Christ's Body.

As the author and editor of over forty books, many of which are the staple of the American Catholic home,

Dr. Hahn has made immense contributions to the Catholic intellectual tradition. He is the Fr. Michael Scanlan Professor of Biblical Theology and the New Evangelization at the Franciscan University of Steubenville. As the Founder and President of the St. Paul Center, Dr. Hahn has dedicated his life to helping Catholics read Scripture from the heart of the Church.

The Dominicans, many of whom have been formed by the writings and lectures of Dr. Hahn, were privileged to honor Dr. Hahn with this award.
